

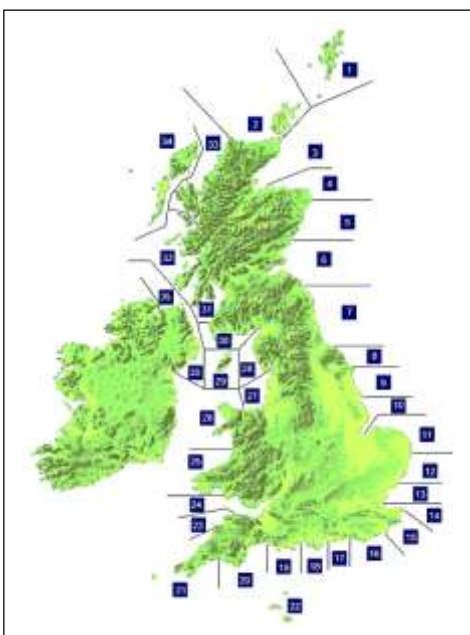


Whales Dolphins and Porpoises on the Saga Pearl 2 “Grecian Odyssey” a report by Robin Petch - www.TheWhaleandDolphinMan.co.uk

As the Chair of Trustees of the Sea Watch Foundation it is my great pleasure to share with you the sightings from our Grecian Odyssey cruise, along with a few of the photographs I have taken. Thank you for your company on deck, and particularly to those of you who reported additional sightings to us. As you will see, we were able to collect an impressive number of sightings, despite variable weather and sea conditions later in the cruise and a port heavy itinerary in the Eastern Mediterranean! For the record, large baleen whales are in any case quite rare in the Eastern part of the Mediterranean but we would normally have expected to see Common, Striped and/or Bottlenose Dolphins in the areas that we visited and both Sperm and Cuvier’s Beaked Whales are known to feed in the deeper waters.

Firstly however, if I may, I would like to tell you a little about our work. Sea Watch Foundation is the leading UK cetacean research charity and has been collecting sightings data since the 1970s to create Europe’s biggest whale, dolphin and porpoise sightings database. This is used to inform EU and national governments, scientific and environmental agencies and NGOs, as well as independent research scientists who have an interest in studying and protecting cetaceans and the marine environment.

- Monitoring the numbers and locations of whales and dolphins in order to gain valuable knowledge of the health of our marine environment, and insight into the effects of chemical pollution, noise disturbance, over-fishing, accidental capture in fishing gear and climate change
- Involving the public in scientific monitoring
- Raising awareness and understanding of marine mammals and the threats they face
- Educating, informing and advising for better environmental protection



The information gathered by Sea Watch since 1991 (and by the Mammal Society’s Cetacean Group since 1973) and our network of observers has been the primary source of knowledge about the relative status and distribution of cetacean around the British Isles. Close links are maintained with similar organisations all over Europe and the information we gather on cruises is added into this database.

Every coastal county of the UK has a Regional Co-ordinator and teams of volunteers help by reporting sightings, raising funds and promoting our work. Cetacean Sightings from the Saga Pearl 2 Grecian Odyssey Cruise (October 2015)

The daily watches were made from the Sun Deck (forward) whenever possible but frequently it was necessary to seek more shelter and watches then took place from Verandah Deck (aft). A full effort record was maintained, with regular position fixes and course, speed and sea conditions as well as sightings logged. At least one of us was on deck throughout most of the daylight hours, and the following sightings were recorded:

Species seen: Common Dolphin, Striped Dolphin, Risso's Dolphin, Bottlenose Dolphin, Pilot Whale, Sperm Whale (probable), Sei Whale (possible), Fin Whale

0955	15+ Bottlenose Dolphins, repeated sightings
1008	2 Bottlenose Dolphins

12/10/15 Leaving Cagliari, Sardinia

1725	4 Common Dolphins, just outside harbour entrance
1821	5+ Common Dolphins

13/10/15 Mediterranean (inc. Straits of Messina)

0855	1 probable Sperm Whale, blowing & diving, 4 smaller, possibly brownish, whales nearer ship (reported by passengers)
1220	4+ Dolphins, feeding with birds (reported by passengers)



14/10/15 Argostoli, Kefalonia, Greece - 21/10/15 Katakolon, Greece - No Sightings

We only had an hour or so of daylight on sailout each day, sometimes in poor weather/visibility. Under other circumstances, sightings of Common, Striped and/or Bottlenose Dolphins might reasonably be expected.

22/10/15 At Sea No Sightings

23/10/15 At Sea 1735 1 dolphin (seen by passenger... well done!)

24/10/15 At Sea 1228 1 Sunfish (not a cetacean, but an unusual and reportable sighting)

1634 1 Large Whale, breached then blew (species unidentified)

25/10/15 Leaving Cartagena, Spain

1655 4+ Pilot Whales

1736 10+ Striped Dolphins (leaping, starboard bow)

26/10/15 Gibraltar, Ship's Dolphin Watching Tour

30+ Common Dolphins (inc. many calves and juveniles)
40+ Striped Dolphins
1 Bottlenose Dolphin (adopted by Common Dolphins when young!)

27/10/15 At Sea 1550 5 Common Dolphins (passenger report, port side)
1554 4 Dolphins (close to Shackleton's, starboard side!)
1604 3 Dolphins (passenger report)
1709 2 probable Fin Whales, blowing c. 3 miles to port

28/10/15 At Sea 1253 4 Dolphins (passenger report, port side)
1404 1 Dolphin (passenger report, port side)

29/10/15 1143 9 Common Dolphins, in 3 groups, 4+3+2, starboard side
